The Class 5 GDL Program

New drivers in Alberta are expected to participate in a licensing process that is completed gradually to provide the skills and knowledge to follow the rules of the road. The graduated licensing program or GDL is a 2-part process that could take up to 3 years to complete. Typically, a learner at the age of 15 starts the GDL process by going to an authorized Alberta registry agent location to take a class 7 knowledge test. Once passed, the student must hold a class 7 Learner's license for a minimum of 12 months without any infractions that could affect the eligibility at the time of a class 5 basic road test. This is the first of the two road tests required to obtain a full license.

Probationary Period

After the 12 month probationary period of holding a class 7 license, the driver will be eligible to take the first of the two road tests that are required to become a fully licensed driver. The first road test is known as the Class 5 basic road test which is half an hour long. A driver examiner will be present in the passenger seat to assess how you operate a vehicle on the road.

Obtaining a class 7 learners license before signing up

Minimum requirements to sign up for a class 5 basic course is to have a class 7 learner's license. Due to Alberta Transportation Board policies and regulations, it is unlawful for a student to practice without one.

Curriculum

According to government policies, in-class sessions must be completed before you can schedule your in-car lessons. A total of 15 hours of in-class lessons must be completed as mandated by the Alberta Transportation Board. At the end of in-class instruction, there will be a multiple choice quiz that must be passed before beginning in-car training hours. All topics on this paper quiz will be covered inclass. Students will receive an email when it's time to schedule in-car sessions through our online scheduling system.

After completing the in-class requirements, a minimum of 10 hours of in-car instruction is required to complete your class 5 basic driver training course. Each in-car session will be 2 hours long. Once you receive the certificate you may go to an authorized Alberta registry agent to add a code "U" to your driver's abstract; this code is recognized by Alberta insurance brokers and will result in insurance rate reductions.
